#### Finding an apprenticeship vacancy

Apprenticeships are jobs and so employers advertise the vacancies and you will need to find a vacancy, apply and attend an interview/assessment centres etc. You need to proactively search for a vacancy for the best chance of getting one. Some large employers start recruiting in the Autumn for apprentices to start the following September, so start looking now.

- Register on the government's 'find an apprenticeship' website. You can search and set up vacancy alerts by location and by level, but also use the filters in the 'browse' area to search by sector. You can also apply for many apprenticeships via the site. https://www.gov.uk/apply-apprenticeship
- Use your network tell everyone you know you are looking for an apprenticeship you may find they know of an opportunity.
- Apply via a college/training provider. Some colleges such as Weston have courses for school leavers that are an apprenticeship and they state in the course content that they can help you find employment. This is because some employers have asked their training provider to start the recruitment process for them. Applying for one of these apprenticeship courses does not guarantee you will be successful in finding employment, and so you should keep looking for apprenticeship vacancies until you get an offer. You should also always have a back-up plan which could be also applying for a full-time course (you can apply to more than one college and more than one course at most, and can decide which offer to accept after you have your results).



• Research and contact employers you are interested in working for. Their website may have an area advertising apprenticeship vacancies (usually under 'careers', 'vacancies' or 'work with us') and you may be able to set up vacancy alerts. Follow the company on social media such as Facebook, Twitter and Instagram as they will probably promote vacancies there. You could also contact employers directly to enquire if they offer any apprenticeships and how you can apply. Some employers publicise their apprenticeship vacancies through events.
