

Super-curricular vs Extra-curricular

Super-curricular activities take the subjects you study further, beyond what you have learnt in your lessons

Extra-curricular activities are those outside of your chosen topic, and unrelated to your studies

Super-curricular is NOT:

- Doing your homework
- Only for those applying for university
- Hours of extra work

Benefits:

- Gives all applications an edge
- Teaches you new skills that you can apply to your lessons
- Helps develop new ideas and opinions


Wed PM is a compulsory part of the Study Programme in Year 12

In term 1, all students participate in 'PE'

In term 2, students are able to do PE, A2B, volunteering or WEX (only if pre-agreed with HoSF).







Work Experience



Students are expected to complete one week of work experience in Year 12, more if desired.

Time is 'allocated' in Term 6 for Year 12 work experience - dates to be confirmed.

The time can be 'part- exchanged' for a different time of the year if it is more convenient. For example every Wednesday afternoon or a week in the Easter holidays or a week in the summer holidays.

Students will need to have your placement found, checked and logged. Students should start researching as soon as possible.

The checking process is done on Unifrog, this ensures that the placement is suitable and correctly checked.

Volunteering

What is the Volunteering programme?

- ★ A programme all Year 12 students will take part in
- ★ Helps you gain experience to draw upon when making applications (E.g. UCAS & Apprenticeships)
- ★ Gives you the opportunity to gain wider experiences that will help your own personal development.

How does the process work?

- ★ Look through the PPT with your tutors during registration, to help you decide what types of activities are on offer
- ★ Follow the QR code sign-up on the next slide to a Google Form where you can state your preferences

Arranging off-site placements and WEX



Once a WEX placement or volunteering activity has been added to unifrog the employer/placement will (automatically) be sent a form to complete with the full placement details.

This means we can check that the employer has Employer liability insurance.

Once the employer has completed their form the parent/guardian (as added by the student) will be sent an email <u>by unifrog</u> to review the placement details and give their consent (please check your SPAM!). This ensures the placement is safe and appropriate.

If you arrive late or leave site during the day you MUST **sign in or out** using the Ipad. It is absolutely essential that we know who is on o is not.

Driving lessons can be booked after 1.20pm <u>if</u> you have no lessons in the afternoon.

Driving lessons should not be booked during the morning in study lessons, These are study times!

Attendance



Attendance is an essential prerequisite for good attainment.

95% attendance = 2 weeks missed

90% attendance = 1 month missed

85% attendance = 1 term missed

*This is especially important in subjects with lots of coursework in order to account for the rise in the use of AI, teachers must be able to regularly assess knowledge in the classroom to be certain work is authentic!







The Student's Study Programme Agreement

As a Sixth Former you must be committed to your studies for the duration of your course and behave in a manner that demonstrates kindness and maturity, setting a good example to younger students at all times. We expect all Sixth Formers to have a positive impact upon their community. Here are the conditions of your Study Programme:

- I will commit to my Study Programme, be punctual, maintain excellent attendance and work to the best of my ability.
- 2. I understand that I am committing to study qualifications for two years.
- If I am absent due to illness, I must communicate this with a phone call to the school absence line by my parents or carer. For long absences, medical evidence should be provided.
- My attendance must be 95% or above. Failure to maintain this without medical evidence is unsatisfactory and will result in removal from subjects, intervention plans or paying for exam fees.
- 5. I will dress appropriately for a school environment.
- 6. Phone use will be sensible and appropriate, I won't allow it to cause issues with my peers and will only be out and used in lessons at the direction of the teacher. I will not use it blatantly in front of younger students around the Academy site.
- 7. I will make sure I am committed to my studies by:
 - · Using holiday time for holidays
 - · Being punctual every day
 - · Studying in my study periods
 - · Investing at least 5 hours per week of private study per subject
 - Keeping part-time employment to a maximum of 15 hours per week.
 - · Organising myself, my work and keeping to deadlines.
 - · Being determined and always ready to learn.
 - · Organising at least 20 hours of work experience during the year
 - Organising at least 20 hours of volunteering this year
 - Keeping driving lessons to afternoons when I don't have a lesson or outside of Sixth Form hours
- 8. I will keep myself safe by complying with signing in/out regulations and wearing my lanyard.
- 9. I will show kindness and respect to both the people and the environment around me.
- I will keep noise to a minimum during study periods and use the Sixth Form Study Spaces for studying.
- 11. When travelling to and from Sixth Form (including if I am off-site during the day) I will do so safely and responsibly by:
 - · Keeping to the speed limit.
 - Keeping my belongings safe.
 - · Acting in a way that reflects well on the Academy around the site.
 - · Registering my vehicle and driving or riding it sensibly.

12. In line with the whole school policy, the consumption of alcohol, tobacco and illegal substances are not allowed on the school site. I will not bring any of those things on site. I will set a positive example to younger students by not smoking or vaping near the school site.

13. I will uphold the ethos of the Sixth Form, acting against bullying, discrimination or anti-social behaviour in any form.

- To communicate effectively with the Tutor if there are issues that are arising, such as concerns around welfare or academic progress, for instance.
- To attend Parents' Evenings, Tutor Contact Evenings and Curriculum/Information Evenings so that you know how your young person is progressing and how to help them prepare for their future.
- 8. To read the 'Key Dates' for the year and other information available on the website.
- To ensure that family holidays or other events do not get booked during Term Time; holidays are not permitted during Term Time.
- To work with and support the Sixth Form if there is a requirement for additional support or intervention for a student's progress, attendance or behaviour.


The Sixth Form's Agreement to Students

Systems: Rewards and sanctions

House Points:

- One House Point: any positive behaviour in line with the Academy's expectations and values - "I've done more than just avoid getting a behaviour point"
- Two House Points: consistent, repeated or significant positive behaviour in line with the Academy's expectations and values
- Three House Points: a "WOW" reward for a special contribution to the Academy or positive behaviour which goes over and above expectations, or sets a role model example for others to follow

What happens if a negative behaviour pattern develops?

- Behaviour contracts and targets
- Removal of 'freedoms'
- Parent/Carer meetings with Tutors, Head of Year, or Head of Sixth Form.
- Removal from Sixth Form

What happens if academic difficulties occur?



- The right balance of challenge and support.
- Structured and strategic help.
- Involvement of subject teachers and, depending on issues, tutor → Year Head → Sixth Form Head / Deputy Head.
- Parental contact.
- Proactive.

16-19 Bursary Fund

The Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) allocate the 16-19 Bursary Fund to the Academy.

It is designed to support post-16 students in full time education with the financial challenges of their continuing education, therefore the funds must be used to support students in their learning.

A student must be aged 16 or over but under 19 on 31 August 2024 to be eligible for help from the bursary fund in the 2024 to 2025 academic year.






