### 1.About us

We have approximately 280 students in our Sixth Form.

We are part of the school, but distinct and different too. We have our own Sixth Form Centre with a community hub in the Common Room, teaching and study spaces.

Many of our students progress to University, around 60% approximately, and around 30-35% of those go on to Russell Group Universities.

We promote alternative pathways, such as apprenticeships and gap years just as strongly in order to make sure every student makes informed choices.

#### 1.About us

We have over 30 courses available to suit different student ability ranges and interests. Our creative courses are particularly strong in their outcomes – students do well!

We have a two week timetable, each fortnight you have 9 lessons for each of your subject in Year 12, 10 in Year 13. All of our subjects are taught by subject specialists.

Year 12 has a focus on skills development, through your subject choices and the habits you form to help you be a successful independent learner.

All of our course are Level 3, which means they are A levels or equivalent.

You are part of a community, we want you to well connected, involved and to make a difference through volunteering and student leadership.

We value structure and pastoral support highly, your teachers and tutors will know you well and support you in your studies.

Our class sizes are around 8-20 students, this enables you to get the personalised teaching and guidance you need.



### **Financial Assistance and Transport Information**

#### 16-19 Bursary Fund

The Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) allocate the 16-19 Bursary Fund to the Academy. It is designed to support post-16 students in full time education with the financial challenges of their continuing education, therefore the funds must be used to support students in their learning.

A student must be aged 16 or over but under 19 at 31 August 2023 to be eligible for help from the bursary fund in the 2023 to 2024 academic year.

Students aged 19 or over are only eligible to receive a discretionary bursary if they are continuing on a study programme they began aged 16 to 18 (19+ continuers) or have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

There are 2 types of 16 to 19 bursary:

- a bursary for students in vulnerable groups
- a discretionary bursary


